Message from the CEO

Meeting Today's Needs: Staying relevant in an ever-changing world

"Justice, opportunities and equitable access for all" is the vision that Archway strives to bring to fruition amongst the various communities we serve. Yet, how do we achieve our mission when community members face poverty, racism, food insecurity, rising housing prices and unstable employment?

Archway's role is to continue being aware of people's current needs and to keep innovating, thereby staying relevant in this ever-changing, increasingly complex world we all live in.



Displaced individuals are arriving on Canada's doorsteps, having fled from war-torn countries. Our Resettlement Assistance Program helps families and individuals find places to live, settles children into supportive school experiences, and helps adults learn English and/or secure employment.

Seniors are increasingly being wrongfully evicted from long-time housing accommodations. Archway has doubled the capacity of our community legal advocates to make sure that older adults have someone on their side to negotiate with landlords and to fight against becoming homeless at this stage of their life.

Some Indigenous youth face racism, shame, abuse, and intergenerational trauma from a society whose stereotypes pronounce them guilty until proven innocent. Foundry Abbotsford now connects youth with Indigenous elders who introduce them to their culture: to history, language, and Indigenous practices that instill pride and an unshakable sense of self-worth; and Diversity Education provides one-on-one validation and support to victims of racism or discrimination.

A record number of women (with their children) are fleeing violence as perpetrated by their intimate partner. Our Sexual Abuse Intervention Program (SAIP) has addressed surmounting waitlists by increasing supports in English and Punjabi; and our Montrose Counselling has expanded access to counselling at the time when it's most needed.

Some of our community's individuals with barriers to employment face the threats of hunger, isolation, and homelessness as they lack the resources to navigate challenges such as developmental disabilities, neurodiversity or limited communication skills. Archway Recycling receives 50+ applications each week from candidates desperate to work. Along with the sustainability benefit of diverting 9,641 metric tonnes of recyclable products from ending up in landfills, Our Abbotsford Mission Recycling Depot provides a steady salary, benefits, ongoing job coaching, and a deep sense of belonging within community for more than sixty income earners (and taxpayers) who might otherwise be unemployed.

More than 5,000 individuals and households, along with 750 school-aged children, are going home daily to empty pantries and fridges. For these neighbours, Archway Food Bank provides ongoing access to healthy, fresh, locally accessible (through 17+ satellite sites), culturally-appropriate food. And Archway Food Justice programs work with community to re-define our broader understanding of and commitment to food security for all.

Together with our amazing community partners, staff, volunteers, and Board, Archway continues to re-define what it means to: secure housing or shelter for those most vulnerable in our communities; enable communities take part in getting nutritious, culturally-appropriate food to those most in need; help women fleeing intimate partner violence to not feel alone; help parents find safe, enriching child care for their little ones; reach out to isolated, vulnerable seniors; and so much more. Thank you for stepping into your role in ensuring "justice, opportunities and equitable access for all."







"It was a very difficult time, and I had all the responsibility of my family," shared Bernard.

After several threats to his life, Bernard fled to Canada where he was introduced to the SAFE HAVEN Refugee Claimant Support Services program, which offers short-term mental health counselling, settlement services, labour market support, English classes, and supported referrals to housing.

While Bernard awaits his refugee asylum hearing date, his wife, mother, sister, and five children remain behind.

Bernard is learning English, applying for jobs and volunteering as he works to build a better future where he can bring his loved ones to Canada, ensuring they too can enjoy the safety and opportunities he has found.

Bernard's journey is a testament to his resilience and determination.

After spending 22 years in the United States, Bev returned to Canada following the death of her husband. She faced bureaucratic obstacles and personal challenges as she had to prove she was Canadian.

After a fall, Bev was referred to Trina of Archway's Social Prescribing Program by the hospital social worker.

"Trina got it figured out and got me all the things I needed. She sat on the phone with government offices, helped with my paperwork, and provided emotional support when I was really down. I was really ready to give up, but Trina helped me get back to the person I was — happy and helping other people. She came in at a very critical point in my life."

Message from the Board President

The Community Builders event recognized another year of amazing contributions from individuals and businesses in Abbotsford who greatly impact the work of community development. This past year's Golf Tournament provided not only an excellent day of golf for a record number of golfers but also \$112,000.00 in funds raised for Archway.

Archway continues to undergo changes to its organizational structure in response to growth of the breadth and scope of services provided and the retirement of key staff. The Board remains grateful for the efforts of Archway's staff for their tireless work in leading that work to strategically prepare and position Archway for stability, resilience and success into the future.

Returning to where we started, it has been a year of changes and a year of staying the same. The Board of Directors has remained the same through a continued commitment to enhancing and strengthening governance competency and capacity to support the good work of Archway, building on the excellent governance structures that are the legacy of previous Boards, including the long-term members who are departing this year. Archway has remained the same through a continued commitment to evolving, amplifying and actualizing the ambitious goals set out in the current strategic plan and furthering the agency's mission of fostering community well-being and social justice through positive action and leadership, building on the organizational culture that is the organization's founding legacy.

As a Board of Directors, we look forward to the next year of Archway embracing change and evolving to stay the same – tirelessly striving for community well-being and social justice.

2023-2028 Strategic Plan

Justice, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (JEDI) issues are amplified and actualized.

- Indigenous reflection evident at all decision-making and service delivery levels.
- Barriers removed that hinder access to all Archway programs and services for clients of indigenous background.
 - For example, Board of Directors and senior leadership team attended UNDRIP training in November 2023.
- Archway staff state that their voice is heard and valued.
 - In year one, staff completed a self-identification survey focused on diversity, equity and inclusion (EDI). The results were analyzed and recommendations are in progress.
- Issues of discrimination and racism are discussed and addressed through the creation of safe dialogue spaces throughout community.

Mental wellness is fostered and promoted through accessible and sustainable initiatives.

- Access to free, multi-lingual counselling and mental health services increased.
 - In year one, work has been done to secure counselling services in Punjabi and Spanish.
- Comprehensive, barrier-free navigation and referral systems across Archway's programs and services are implemented.
- Trauma informed outreach and community-wide education is delivered.

More housing options for low-income residents in Abbotsford

- Housing stock for seniors is protected and increased.
- Housing First options, in Abbotsford are increased, specifically addressing the need for supportive housing and shelter beds.
 - In year one, funding was secured to operate 30 shelter beds, year-round, for those over the age of 50.
 - Also, a new collaboration with the City of Abbotsford was established for use of the Ag-Rec building for an Emergency Weather Shelter.
- Approval and funding for a facility dedicated to immigrants and refugees in need of temporary accommodation is secured.
